

Sacred Reading Miriam the Dancing Prophet

In the heart of ancient Egypt, there lived a young Hebrew named Miriam, the daughter of Amram and Jochebed who were enslaved under Pharaoh. As Miriam grew, she witnessed the suffering of her kin. Yet amidst this despair, she also witnessed her parents' courage, defying Pharaoh's decree to kill all newborn Hebrew baby boys. And so they hid their baby, Moses, in a basket in the midst reeds of the Nile. Young Miriam watched over her baby brother to ensure his safety as he drifted down the river. When Pharaoh's daughter discovered Moses and took him in as her own, Miriam approached her and offered to find a Hebrew woman to nurse the child. Thus, Moses was returned to his mother's care. As Moses grew, Miriam became his mentor, supporting and challenging him with regard to the liberation of the Hebrew people. Miriam would become a prophetess and when Moses returned to Egypt to confront Pharaoh and demand liberation for the Hebrew's, she joined him in leading Israel to freedom. When the time came for the Israelites to leave Egypt for freedom, Miriam danced, leading the procession with tambourine in hand. As they approached the shores of the Red Sea, with Pharaoh's murderous army in hot pursuit, Miriam lifted her voice clear and strong above the chaos. Into My Hands This Day

First position (hands held open, shape of a house)

Into my hands this day is given all that I need to dance with Love in Life
All of the joy and all of the sorrow;
All of the success and all of the failure
All of the ease and all of the suffering;
All of this, the elements of the one Life that has been given to me to live into this day

Second position (hands in prayer/namaste)

And with these gifts, I am called to take the seat of the student.

For all that has been given to me into this day exists so that I might grow my body, mind, and Spirit This learning may be easy or difficult; simple or complex;

It may require my attention for a moment or for a lifetime;

The outcome is not my focus Opening to the teaching, in some small way, into this day, is enough.

Third position (hands open, pinkies touching, fingers spread is a gesture of giving & receiving)

As I open, I am welcomed into the Heart of Love, A Holy rhythm, a dance of giving and receiving Like the movement of my breath, in & out, Or the beating of my heart; The rising and setting of the sun, The rise & fall of the tides.

I am invited to remember that my one precious life is not only for me,

It can be poured out into the world as a gift in service toward others and a greater good.

This is my life breathing and dancing – set forth toward my friends and even toward those who appear in Life as my enemy.

Fourth position (cross hands in front of each other and hook thumbs - shape of bird's wings, resting on the heart

And if I should ever feel fearful or alone, Let me remember that the Source of my Life, is with me. I am embraced by Love, like a dove alighting upon my heart. Assured that I am beloved – created originally good and open to possibility. And so I can choose now the Loving Action that will set forth my body, mind, and Spirit, Into This Day.
